Course Description:

This course presents an overview of topics in Development Economics. This field studies issues related to developing countries: the possible reasons why some countries are poor and others rich - geography, history, institutions, culture; the progress that we have seen over the last century and potential interventions - urbanization, trade, health, education; and some of the challenges currently faced - corruption, conflict. The course provides a broad look at these issues through guided reading of a mix of seminal books and papers.
